

Dixie Mayor Felt Celebrezze Wrath

Anthony Celebrezze, veteran mayor of Cleveland, is the new U. S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

President Kennedy yesterday named the five-term mayor to succeed Abraham Ribicoff, who resigned last week to run for the Senate from Connecticut.

Celebrezze is a strong opponent of civil rights. But his chief pride during his years as mayor has been the city's removal of slum clearance and urban renewal projects.

He recently was embroiled in a bitter controversy with the mayor of Centerville, Ala., who had sent a 15-member Negro family to Cleveland as "reverse Freedom Riders."

"My first reaction . . . was to merely tell you to go to hell," Celebrezze wrote Centerville Mayor A. W. Oakley Sr. But, he added, he decided no action would be taken to prevent other Negroes from coming to Cleveland because "they're American. They have a right to free movement."

"May I suggest to you," he told Oakley, "when you begin to feel that you are a little better than your fellow man, you should pause and reflect for a moment, and you will come to a determination that you had nothing to do with what you were born to do with in which you were born to do the parents you were born to do the color of your skin."

Celebrezze is born at Ansonia, Conn. One of 13 children, his parents were visiting their homeland in 1910 after having become American citizens.

A short, stocky man of 51, with jet black hair thinning at the temples, Celebrezze does not have the back-slapping personality usually associated with politicians.

He is generally quiet unless speaking before City Council, at which time his deep voice reaches a booming pitch.

Mansfield Asks Ribicoff Assist Medicare Push

Washington — Sen. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield yesterday sent former Health Secretary Abraham A. Ribicoff a distress call for his help to get a compromise version of President Kennedy's Medicare bill through the Senate this week.

Mansfield's office made public a telegram in which the Montana urged the recently-resigned Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare to return from Connecticut tomorrow and Tuesday "to assist us in connection with the health bill."

The key vote on the compromise measure, providing health care for the aged under medical security, is set for Tuesday afternoon.


